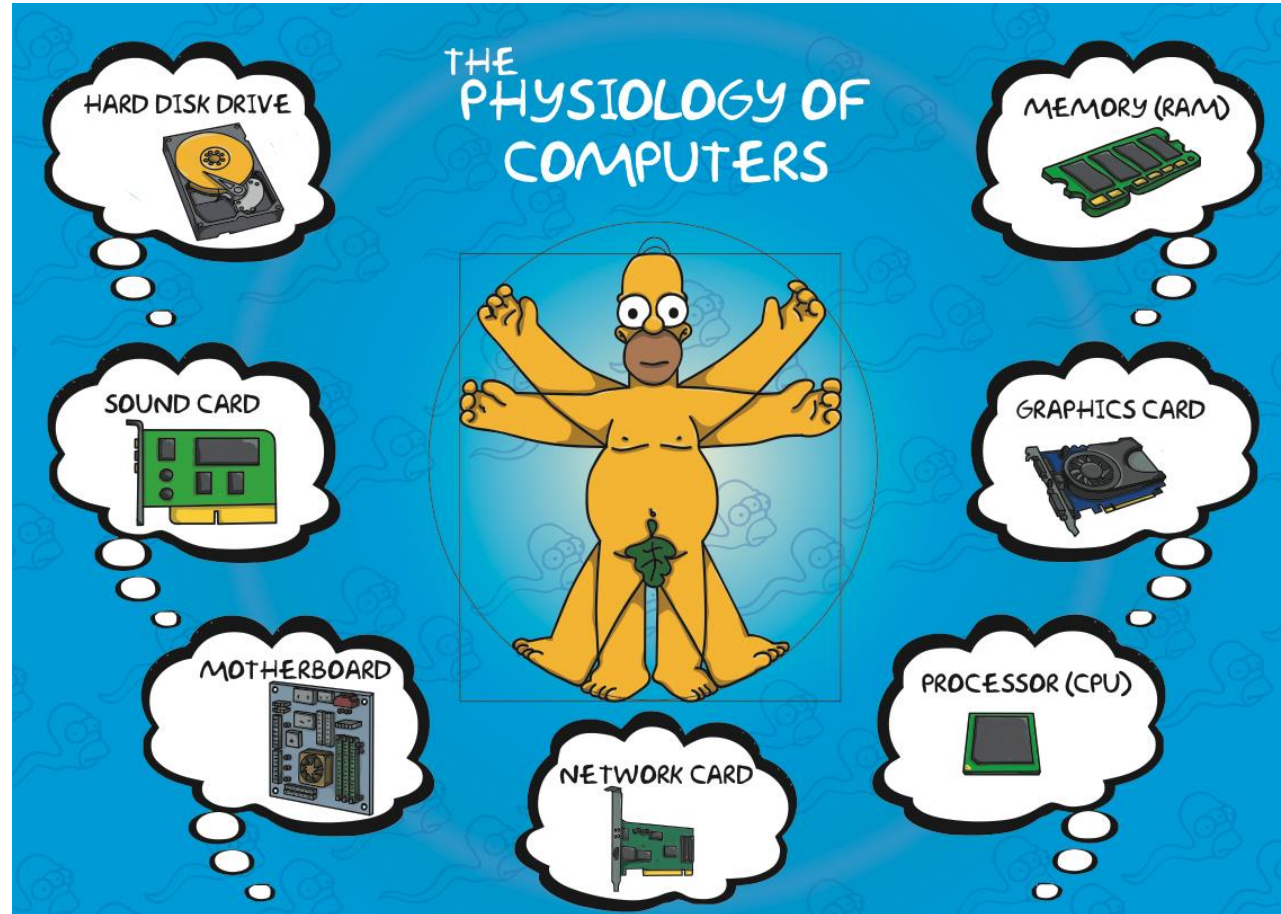

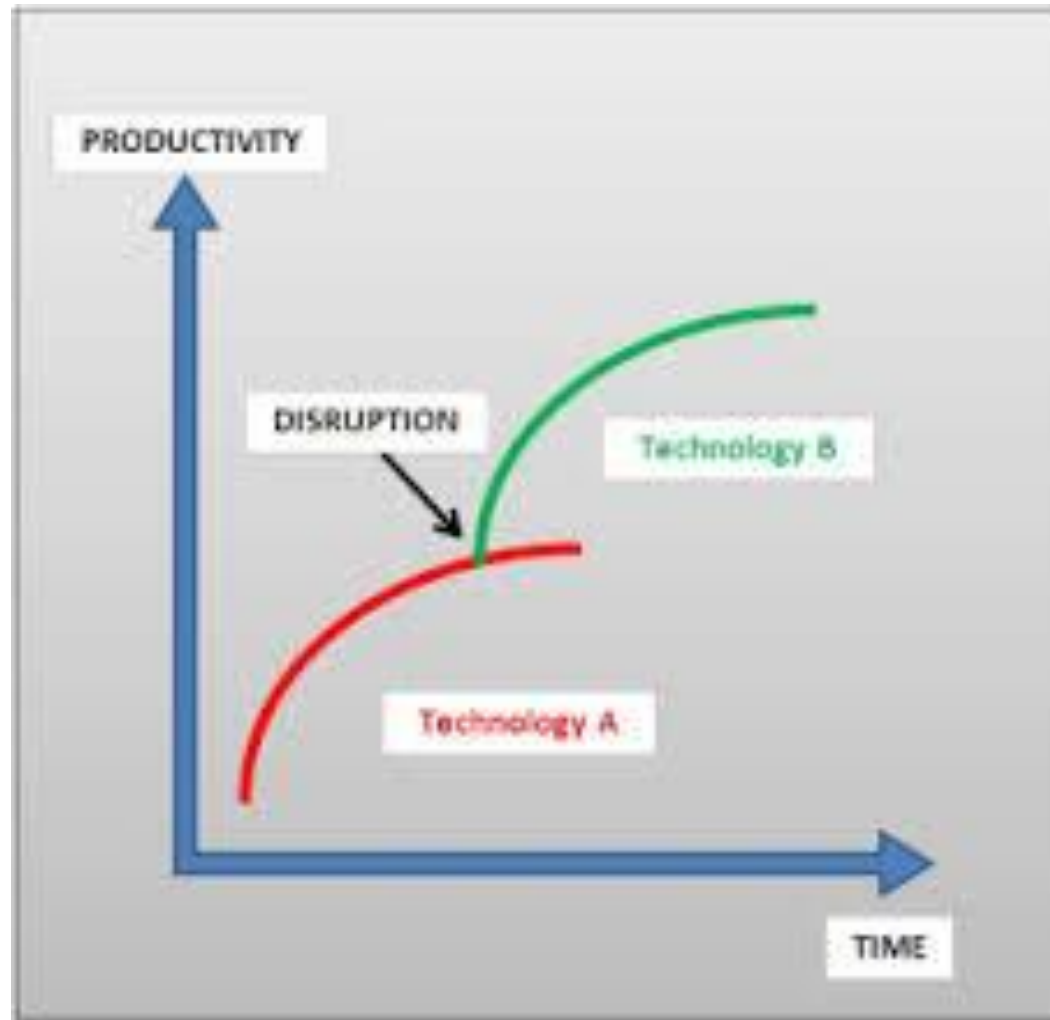

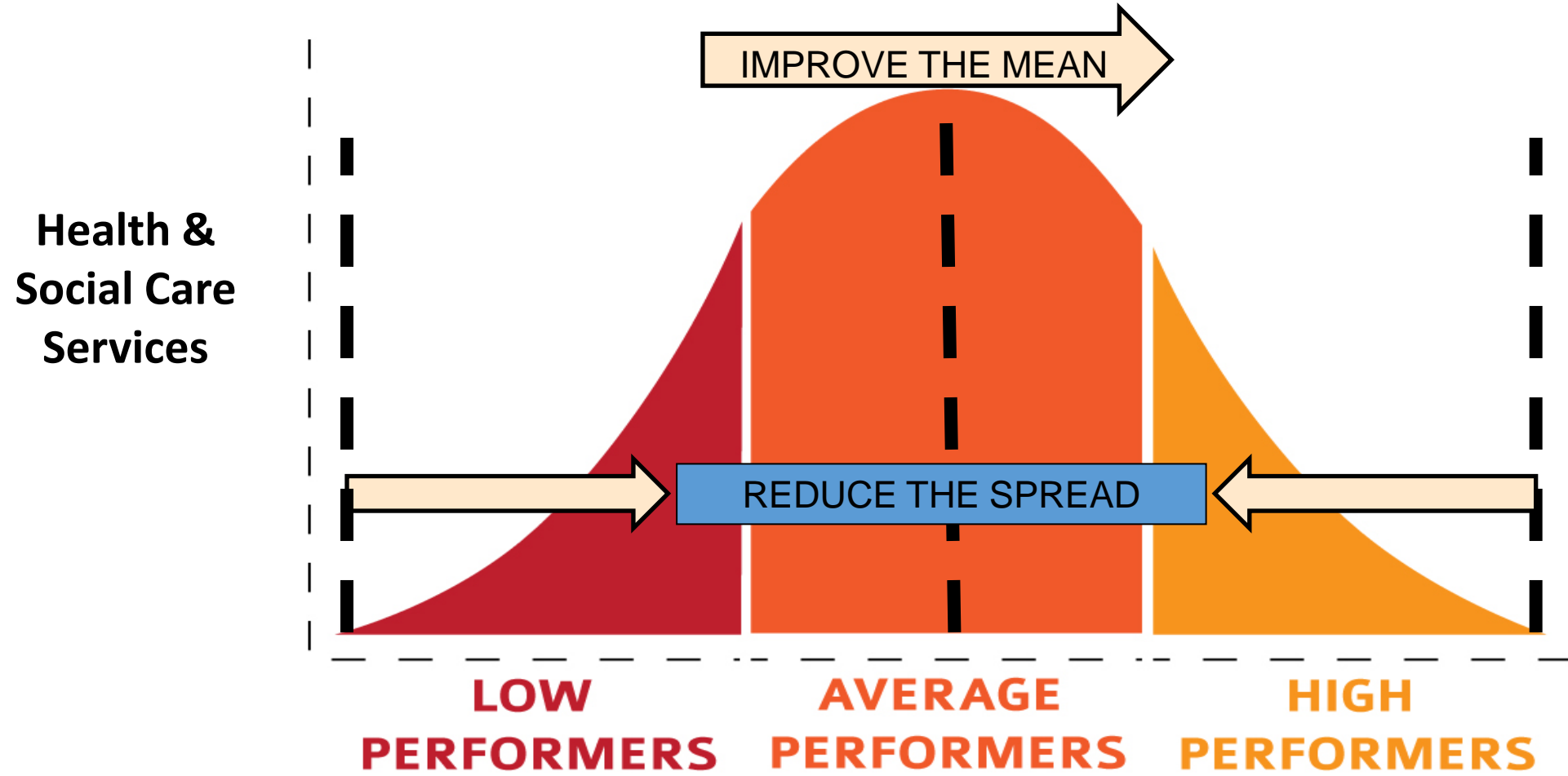


Outpatients – The same model now as in 1930

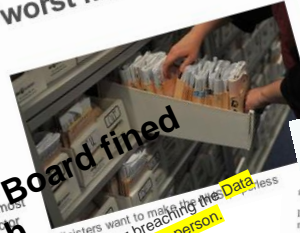

NHS IT system one of 'worst fiascos ever', say MPs

Taxpayers face a rising, multi-billion pound bill for a failed government IT project, MPs have said.

A report by the influential Public Accounts Committee (PAC) concluded an attempt to upgrade NHS computer systems in England ended up becoming one of the most expensive fiascos in public sector history.



Aneurin Bevan Health Board fined £70,000 for data breach

A Welsh health board has become the first NHS body to be fined for breaching the Data Protection Act after it released sensitive data about a patient to his secretary.

Aneurin Bevan Health Board (ABHB) will have to pay a £70,000 penalty. A doctor misspelt a name and did not give enough detail about a patient to his secretary. A report was sent to someone with a similar name.

NHS Trust fined £325,000 following data breach affecting thousands of patients and staff

Brighton and Sussex University Hospitals NHS Trust has been served with a Civil Monetary Penalty (CMP) of £325,000 following a serious breach of the Data Protection Act (DPA), the Information Commissioner's Office (ICO) said today.

The fine is the highest issued by the ICO since it was granted the power to issue CMPs in April 2010. It follows the discovery of highly sensitive personal data belonging to tens of thousands of patients and staff - including some relating to HIV and Genito Urinary Medicine (GUM) patients - on hard drives sold on an Internet auction site in October and November 2010.

EAST OF ENGLAND Trust apologises for problems with flagship electronic records system IT set up causes 'major incident'

Cambridge University Hospitals Foundation Trust has apologised to GPs after "a significant number of problems" with the implementation of its new electronic records system.

The system, provided by US company Epic, has been one of the most closely watched NHS IT projects in recent years. It went live on 20 October.

It is the first time an NHS trust has implemented the well regarded, but relatively expensive, American system.

A briefing note sent to GPs, seen by H&J, said problems delayed emergency care and appointments, and the system was "unstable" shortly after going live. A trust spokesman told H&J "90 per cent" of the implementation had been successful.



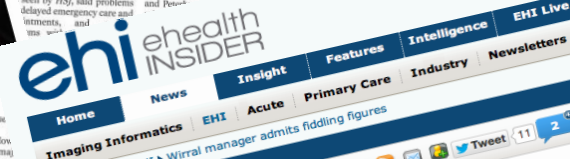
Switching to the system in Cambridge caused problems with blood tests
