


Self murder is wisely and religiously considered by the English law as the most heinous description of felonious homicide; for as no man hath power to destroy life, but by commission of God, the author of it, the suicide is guilty of a double offence: one spiritual, invading the prerogative of the Almighty, and rushing in His presence uncalled for; and the other temporal, against the king, who has an interest in the preservation of all his subjects.

This offence, therefore, is ranked by the law amongst the highest crimes, making it a peculiar species of felony, a felony committed on oneself."












