At the screening appointment, you may require drops in your eyes to temporarily make your pupils larger. The photographs are then sent to an expert to review.</li> <li>The appointment will last approximately 30 minutes.</li> </ul> |
| Advice<br>for the<br>appointment | <ul> <li>If you wear glasses (distance glasses in particular) or contact lenses, bring them along. You should also bring lens solution for contacts.</li> <li>Your eyes can feel sensitive after the eye drops – sunglasses may help.</li> <li>You should not drive or operate machinery after your screening appointment as the eye drops will affect your sight for up to nine hours.</li> </ul>   |
